Este libro tiene la arriesgada pretensión de ofrecer un pasaje a un lugar en el que apenas ha estado nadie. El lugar es la historia que está más allá de lo social, no en contra de lo social. En el siglo XX, el triunfo del pensamiento de izquierda –un pensamiento masculino espléndido– ha ido llevando a la gente a creer que toda la historia es social. Y, sin embargo, no es así, como han aprendido por

experiencia y con padecimiento algunas feministas que, en la década de los setenta, empezaron a escribir historia de las mujeres guiadas, con ilusión, por el paradigma de lo social. Creían que todo cabía en él, también el sentido libre del ser mujer. Pero no cupo. Cupo el estereotipo de género femenino, es decir, cupo lo que en la vida de una mujer tiene que ver con el poder. Pero no cupo todo lo demás: no cupo la diferencia sexual. Porque el poder, importantísimo como, por desgracia, es, no ha ocupado nunca ni la historia entera ni la vida entera de nadie. En el paradigma de lo social no cupo nada o apenas nada del amor, es decir, de lo que hace historia orientado por la metáfora del corazón.
