Although the word 'phonics' sounds similar to the words 'phonetics' and 'phonology', it is actually a system for relating sounds to spellings in order to develop reading and writing skills. The phonics system contains 42 \u25a1letter sounds\u25a1 which relate to the most common spelling patterns in English, and use letter combinations to relate sounds to spellings.

Phonetics and phonology are two absolutely different terms, but equally important. Phonology is a subfield of linguistics that studies how sounds work in a language or languages in general at the mental and abstract level and phonetics studies the physiological and acoustic nature of sounds.

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Phonetics is often defined with respect to phonology. Both disciplines are concerned with the sound medium of language . Phonology is concerned with the pattering of sounds in a language (and in language in general), and is thus comparable to areas of linguistics such as syntax and morphology which deal with structural elements of language at other levels.
